On Earth, the final resting place for Marian Walker at the age of 95 this past week is the Ashley Cemetery not far from the Walker Dairy Farm just off of Walker Road. Marian was a role model for me back in the 1980's as she served on the Cornell Cooperative Extension Human Ecology Program Advisory Committee. Her sewing and cooking skills were the kind to learn whenever you had the opportunity. Her legacy will live on in the family, Home Economics and 4-H connections that she made.

Teresa Langhorn came for the All Western Evergreen Nursery & Christmas Tree Farm for a 1 hour tour on Monday, June 25th. Although this is not the ideal time to visit a Christmas tree farm because the trees have not hardened off their new growth yet and they look so different from the actual tree at Christmas. The new growth is soft and floppy and a different color green or blue than the old growth part of the tree. To me, the trees look like they have new dresses, as all the tips are a different color, usually a lighter color. The birds, especially large heavy birds that land on the leaders usually break the tops. On some farms, T top poles higher than the trees have been the answer to this problem. Because we have so many trees taller in the woods surrounding our tree lots, we have had minimal damage from birds. Still, at this time of year, the plantations do not look as good as they will in the fall after the trees have "hardened off" and we have gone through, tied tops, sheared properly, and cleaned out the weeds under the trees and cross-mowed the rows of trees.

The first in a series of 6 presentations on "Imagine No Racism" was held June 7th, at the Webster's Crossing United Methodist Church sponsored by 7 area churches.
