Next week I will have to tell you how far I have progressed on my legacy and if any one shares their efforts toward a legacy goal.

Emily wrote: Whatever else the day may bring, one thing is always true, that God is ever constant in the love He has for you. Please don't forget His love for you. Pastor Dorothy Hotchkiss of the Webster's Crossing United Methodist Church and the Groveland Federated Parish writes: I would like to (continue to) share the story line of "Benjamin's Box" by Melody Carlson with illustrations by Jack Stockman. This children's book is a fictional story of a little boy that lived in Jerusalem. We walk with Benjamin during Holy Week. He will collect items (memories), to place in a box that he received from his grandfather. Only one item (straw) was in the box at the beginning of the story. Benjamin added a tuft of hair from a donkey that a man rode into Jerusalem as the people shouted, "Hail to our new King". Benjamin heard his name was Jesus. The next day Benjamin and his friend Eli went to hear Jesus teach. In the crowd they heard that some people wanted Jesus to be killed because they didn't like Jesus' teachings. So Benjamin went to the men that were with Jesus to warn

them. The man Benjamin spoke to gave him a silver coin, and said "Don't worry". The next day Benjamin helped prepare a room for Jesus and his friends to come together to eat supper. Benjamin heard Jesus say the wine was like Jesus' blood and would be spilled; the bread was to be broken like his body. Also, Jesus said that someone would betray him. That made no sense to Benjamin. Benjamin found a broken cup on the floor after supper and kept it for his box. Benjamin knew the man, Judas, who gave Benjamin a coin that would prevent danger coming to Jesus. Each night Benjamin placed his tokens in "Benjamin's Box". He added the coin of betrayal and the broken cup from the sacrificial meal. Many times what we experience makes no sense to us. Why did Jesus allow Judas to betray him? Why did Jesus speak of the physical pain he would endure and not stop it? Why? It was for the fulfillment of God's promise to us to have eternal life with him. It's for each of you and for me! Read Matthew 18:12 -14, the Lost Sheep parable. God seeks those who feel lost, broken, or of no value. Verse 13b, [CEB]: "God is happier about finding that one sheep than about the ninetynine who didn't wander off". God doesn't want to lose one – not you, not me!
