The display of pumpkins, gourds, and squashes was unmatched – different colors, sizes, species on pallets and raised boxes looked so inviting. Tomatoes and corn were in abundance. Greg Hargrave introduced me to his children's pet animals. There were two different species of rabbits, three of chickens, two of pigs, and 5 sheep. Greg even petted the pigs! Not having grown up on a farm, I had no idea that you petted pigs or pigs would let you pet them. No, I did not attempt to touch any of the animals. I did, however, purchase a pie pumpkin to make pumpkin pie from scratch from "Granny", learned that "Auntie" was harvesting the pumpkins using the utility vehicle, and the "girls" were in 4-H and had large show animals too, only because of no Fairs due to the virus they did not work with the large animals as much this year. When asked for some farm history, Greg mentioned the Hargraves are the fifth generation and the farm was under other names like Parks in year's past.
